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Director's Message

We explored the Frosty Box which was filled with winter objects: arctic toy animals (snow hare, polar bear), clothes (snow boots, scarf, blanket, socks, mittens, gloves, hat, jumper, sleeping bag). We read many stories about Arctic animals, learnt about them and created amazing crafts and paintings, inspired by them.

The cold couldn't keep us inside, because the Busy Bees were curious to observe the weather and to feel the changes in nature. We played in the snow, threw snowballs, built a snowman in our yard and dressed it up. We even brought the snow inside and created some science experiments. The Busy Bees observed the water and ice and made predictions and estimations about the time it would take for the ice to melt inside and for the water to freeze outside.





We celebrated The Storytelling Week and spent quality time with the children's parents and grandparents and teachers, who came into our classroom and read fabulous stories in English, Romanian and Italian. We went on a trip to a local bookshop and enjoyed the wonderful books that we found there.

In Maths we explored the 2D shapes and discovered the 3D shapes in the objects around us. We thought critically, choosing better ways to do things and finding new ways of solving problems. We revisited calculating more and less by finding one more or less cubes and counters and then writing the number that we found.

In Phonics we revised the sounds taught last term and learnt new sounds. We blended phonemes and to read a few words. We love to play phonics games (I spy with my little eye, Roll a Sound, match the letter and find the word). We are now beginning to write our names on our work.

In our IT lessons we continued to learn how to log onto the computers and how to hold and control the mouse correctly. We enjoyed the visit from Robbie, a very friendly, flexible and interactive robot, used as an innovative learning tool.



Spring came and the Busy Bees made a new friend - Buzz The Bee, our class toy!

Each weekend, Buzz the Bee goes home with one of the EYFS pupils, to see their families, to meet their friends and to have a great time together. We heard many nice stories about the children's adventures with Buzz the Bee and we saw many pictures to prove these things.

We took part at very interesting assemblies. In one of them we learnt about The Romanian Police Day and we met a brave policeman. Another assembly, prepared by Early Years was about Seasons, where the children told their parents and the whole school the story of the four seasons, with joyful songs and dressed in costumes.



Recently we have started an exciting class project, "Let's see where mummy/daddy works" and we had one day trips to our parents workplaces. We took part in a health conference and asked questions regarding fruit and vegetables to doctors from Bucharest and Italy at Stefan's parents workplace.

We explored the farm, counted the cows, the baby calves and the bulls. We observed how the tractors and harvesters function at Alexandru's parents workplace.

We visited a warehouse to taste fruit and vegetables and also to find out how frozen and fresh vegetables are processed, at Vivienne's parents work place. We also visit Nimet Eda's parent workplace, The International School of Oradea, because we wanted to know how the first Cambridge school of Oradea works and what teachers do every day.

Our project will continue in summer, with many interesting trips to other student's parents workplaces.

A child that plays is a happy child! A healthy child! A busy child! Playtime is for a child what work is for an adult. Don't underestimate the importance of playtime, because it is essential for the growth and development of your child. There are many articles, books and a wealth of research on this topic that supports and explains this.

Children negotiate during play and build connections in the brain, which helps to regulate emotions, to make plans and to solve problems easily. This kind of brain development paves the way to success in school and life!

Through play children actually learn better and think faster (even if adults can't see it like this!), they explore and test limits. By playing, children can communicate and socialise, be creative and develop different types of skills.

They develop friendships through play and this means a lot.

Ultimately let's not forget the most important part of play: it's relaxing and fun!

How do children play?



Children need to play every day. So let them play, encourage them to play. Don't worry and don't spoil their joy with your fears, such as hurting themselves or making a mess - they will be fine! Whether they play alone or with others it's a matter of personal choice, but this tells a lot about the children's ways of learning.

There are different types of play:

- * Solitary play (the child plays by him/herself).
- * Spectator play (the child watches others playing without joining in).
- * Parallel play (the child plays side by side with another child, with similar materials, but without any interaction).

* Co-operative play (children interact, take turns, share and decide how and what to play).





To play or not to play

Adults should provide support, props, time and space to develop children's play. We need to take time to observe, consult, plan, and participate in play. The adult role has different dimensions, most importantly when to intervene and when to stand back. Playing with your child regularly will help you to know when and how to act. An important part of play for young children is playing with parents and there should be some time for this every day. It doesn't have to be a very strict game, it's about knowing each other better and spending time together.

Rules for the play

Here are some basic rules to guide quality play:

- * interact during the play, but don't always intervene or intrude;
- * allow your child to explore the environment and to lead you in the game;
- * smile and laugh together.
 - Enjoy this one-on-one time with your little one, as it is unique and extremely precious!

Is playing dear?

Playing is not about fancy toys. Children eagerly play with simple objects of different sizes, shapes and textures and this helps them gain increase their imagination.





Valuable toys for young children are:

- * paper and paint;
- * water and sand;
- * play dough;
- * a garden or park to explore;
- * mud;
- * real pots and pans;
- * pegs and containers to put them in;
- * wooden spoons;
- * wooden blocks;
- * age appropriate construction;
- * sets of animals, toy people and cars;
- * animals and insects to watch;
- * old clothes to dress up in/dress up costumes;
- * boxes of all sizes and shapes;
- * toys to ride on..



Playing with play dough is always a popular choice when it comes to toddlers and school children.

Here is a very simple, safe and fun homemade play dough recipe to try with your child.

Ingredients:

- * 2 measures of self raising flour (for measures you can use spoons, cups, lids or any other containers);
- * 1 measure of cold water;
- * food colours (optional);
- * spices can be added for smell (optional).

Mix them well and you will obtain a stretchy play dough how and what to play).



Play for school children:

Puzzles can help children develop their problem-solving skills.

Games outside: children need at least one hour of physical play each day, when they run, jump and play games in the fresh air. This will encourage muscle development and general fitness as well as opportunities for creativity and the development of social skills.

Card games: these can be memory and matching games build their vocabulary and increase their understanding of the world.

Playing a musical instrument: this helps children's development of body awareness, language, understanding of culture and listening. Music is for enjoy ment and also great for relaxation.

Reading books together: the type of book is optional as it is for enjoyment.

Have you thought about playing games with the words in nursery rhymes and stories to create fun games?

Technology: nowadays this is fun and relaxing for children of all ages. Many games can be found on the TV, on the computer, on tablets or on mobile phones. Screen technology is a big part of how they learn, socialise and have fun. Please note that it is essential

to supervise your child when they are using devices online and advisable to have limits for your child's screen time.

Don't forget: no matter the age, the best play for your child is to play with parents, as well as with grandparents and other special adults.

Play ideas for parents

- * Hide and seek;
- * Go for a walk in the forest, in the park, in the city... and listen to different sounds, e.g. birds, cars, footsteps, animal noises, find different surfaces to walk on e.g. lawn, gravel, leaves;
- * Gardening (especially digging, watering, playing in puddles!);
 - * Helping prepare a meal;
 - * Picnics;
 - * Swings;
- * Pretend play let the child decide who will play which role and make the rules;
 - * Singing and dancing together;
 - * Dressing up;
 - * Kicking and throwing balls;
 - * Carpentry;
 - * Washing the car;
 - * Helping with the housework;
- * Going to work with you for a short time and letting them "help" (within reason);
 - * A trip to the shops (not to buy them a present);
 - * Watch a favourite TV show or film together.





War play

Most children at some time or other (especially boys around the age of four), play games that involve weapons, cowboys, policemen and thieves or superhero games. Some studies say that war play is important to children's development, because it gives them a sense of power, of control when other things make them feel powerless and weak. There are other researchers concerned that this play says to children that parents think using violence solves problems or supports prejudice against some people or groups, e.g. the "baddies" are from a different race or







What to do about war play:

* ban war play altogether, but this may

run the risk of children doing it anyway and then hiding it from you;

* put limits on it such as where and when it is played (N.B. it is not allowed in school at anytime), to make sure that no-one gets hurt and it doesn't interfere with other children's games;

* you can allow it and use it to help your child develop creative play and to think about what it means, e.g. ask what will happen next, how the enemy who is hurt feels, how you could make peace?

*if you notice that the play is about particular children, groups or issues, you should talk about it with the child and limit exposure of children to inappropriate material;

* if you allow it, and girls want to join in, they may need help to find a place in the games.

Play connects children with their imagination, their environment, their family, and with the world. Keep on playing, and you and your child will remain happy children!

Primary Year 1 - Evergreens

In the first half of this term we traveled all the way to the Arctic pole and met all kinds of impressive Arctic animals. We were thrilled with the walruses tusks and with the polar bears. Our hearts melted with how cute the Arctic hares were!

We compared the weather in the Siorapaluk (in the Arctic circle) with London and Oradea. We found out that Siorapaluk was always consider ably colder, but the temperatures in London and Oradea were not as dissimilar as we thought they would be.

In art we created our own colourful polar bear landscapes by using different kinds of media and polar bear silhouettes.

For homework we made incredible Arctic projects. They were all individual as we each choose what we wanted to find out about.

The best thing was that we could all talk about our work, because although we had some help it was led by us. Our projects included a non-fiction book, a 3D poster, models, documentaries and even a story!

Primary Year 1 - Evergreens

We used some of this knowledge to create and write a class story about a penguin, which we performed to the children and parents in our class assembly. Our assembly also linked our PSHE learning about helping others, being aware of how lucky we are and charity.

Our Arctic explorations came to an end on 22nd February when Primary worked together in teams on 2 projects. The first was making hot chocolate for each other and the Early Years children. We had to boil milk, take orders and serve the drinks. The second was to think about and create structures that represented what we had learnt. When they were finished some of the staff had to guess what we had made.

This half term we started to
learn what maps are including
aerial views, which are also called a birds eye view.
We looked at aerial views of different places and
talked about what shapes and features we can see. We
also had to think carefully about what features we cannot
see. We looked at a map of a zoo and found many different
animals by using the key. After that we created our own unique
map symbols. Using all of this new knowledge, we created treasure
maps for our charity event to raise money to buy at least 1 package
in the "Un paste mai bun" campaign.

To prepare for our charity event, we had to think about what jobs we each needed to do, how to promote and advertise it and the organisation. We decided that we wanted to make and sell salads and lemonade at our event, so in Design and Technology we needed to first investigate how a professional product was made and costs and then base our own drink on this. We would like to say thank you to Snoozz who supported us in this by allowing us to

visit and find this out. We then planned our own recipes, bought an ingredient and made our products.


Primary Year 2-4 - Oaks & Tigers

are in the month of April! So what have we achieved this term?

Our first half termly topic was "Arctic Adventures," and we tried to find out as much as possible about this part of the world. We studied facts about the region and learned through science and PHSE lessons that it is truly endangered! We thought about this a lot and in our class assembly tried to alert everyone to what was happening......and more importantly what we can do to slow down the "arctic melt". We learned that what we can do to help avert this catastrophe, are really very simple things like, putting out the lights when leaving a room, turning the television off correctly, use less water, walk or cycle instead of using the car. Throughout the topic we read a variety of adventure in the snow stories and found out many facts about polar animals and their lifestyle. Of course, we couldn't forget about the Antartctic (or South Pole)! In the past explorers have tried to find a way through Antarctica to China, a safe route was never found. Shackleton was one of many explorers who led perilous expeditions, his story is told in a simple and entertaining way in "You wouldn't want to be on Shackleton's Polar Expedition", by Jen Green. In art lessons, we studied the "Northern Lights" a beautiful Arctic phenomenon, studied the colours and tried to recreate this wonder of nature.

We learned how to draw arctic animals and made 3D polar bears and penguins, built an ice hotel and (junk model) ships. Throughout the half term mathematical learning continued and the children completed a shape project which they shared with their classmates, I was impressed with their confidence and knowledge.



More recently our focus has been on Springtime (Blooming Adventures). We have raked and hoed and sown seeds and are checking the progress of our "botany babies" everyday. It is good to see the children rush to the windows each morning and compare changes from the day before!

We have read some very interesting stories based on flowers; "The Judgemental Flower" highlights accepting difference and "The Dandelion Seeds Big Dream" teaches us about the life cycle of this flower but in a way that encourages children to never give up. In art we have once again returned to Van Gogh and made our own versions of the Sunflower, mixing colours for effect. We also used shapes to create flowers and learned to use Oil-based pastels.

In PHSE we have looked at ways of helping others and have worked to encourage "charitable actions." The class have made cube boxes from nets, filled them with sweets and packaged them nicely. We invited parents to join us in this activity and now have many boxes to sell!
